### NOTES ON THIS SUNDAY'S MUSIC

Although he was arguably the most significant German organist and church musician before Bach, we know comparatively little about Dietrich Buxtehude's early years. The year of his birth is uncertain, and it's even unclear whether he was a native of Denmark or Germany. His early training is something of a mystery: many music historians believe he studied with his father, Johann, but while it's a reasonable guess, there's no conclusive proof. In fact, it's only when he began a 40 year tenure as the organist of St. Mary's Church in Lubeck, Germany that his life suddenly became well-documented. Lubeck was a center of cultural activity, and St. Mary's Church, with its great organ and tradition of outstanding music, was the hub of the city's artistic endeavors. As organist of St. Mary's, Buxtehude was the de facto director of all musical events in Lubeck, and his position entitled him to prestige (and remuneration!) that few other musicians in Germany could match. No wonder that the 20-year-old Bach walked over 200 miles on foot in 1705 to meet and study with the aged master: he was a rock star!

Mindful that it's often easier to praise God in times of prosperity than in adversity, Anna Barbauld (1743-1845) included stanzas for both themes in her hymn "Praise to God, Immortal Praise." The "adversity stanzas" have mercifully been dropped from modern hymnals, and what's left is a hymn of thanks for the harvest season.

In some hymnals, the tune for the hymn we know as "Fairest Lord Jesus" was called "Crusader's Hymn" because it was (supposedly) sung by German Crusaders as they made their way to the Holy Land. Perhaps there's some romantic appeal in the idea, but it's nonsense. The Jesuit text could not have appeared before the end of the crusades, and mention of the tune doesn't appear until 1842!

Henry Smart (1813-1879) was a capable composer of church music who wrote some very fine hymn tunes (REGENT SQUARE, our Recessional, is the best-known). Smart gave up a career in the legal profession for one in music. Although largely self-taught, he became proficient in organ playing and composition, and he was a music teacher and critic. Organist in a number of London churches, Smart was famous for his extemporizations and for his accompaniment of congregational singing. He became completely blind at the age of fifty-two, but his remarkable memory enabled him to continue playing the

organ until his death.

Some weeks ago, we heard a lively piece ("Rigaudon") as our postlude by Andre Campra (1660-1744) who was organist at both Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris and at the Royal Chapel at Versailles. Most likely, it was written for a royal procession of some sort and reflects the stately pomp befitting the entrance of the King. "Grand Choeur" is a bit more grandiose, although it bears harmonic and even melodic similarities to the earlier-heard work. (Grand Choeur, incidentally, means simply "great chorus": that is, the organ builds up to quite a climax at the end!) ~HT--
